

EMERGENCY: FLOOD DISASTER IN SHUWA/MAIDUGURI-BORNO STATE NORTHEAST NIGERIA

We are deeply devastated by the flood that has engulfed Shuwa communities in Madagali, Adamawa State on the 26th of August and Maiduguri city and its environs from the 8th of September to date. Our hearts go out to the families who have tragically lost their loved ones, homes and livelihoods in this calamity.

This disaster serves as a sober reminder of the increasing threats posed by climate change, not just globally, but particularly to regions like ours. Nigeria's vulnerability to flood disasters has been highlighted time and again, as witnessed during the devastating floods of 2012, 2018, and 2022. These areas like Northern Nigeria, particularly Maiduguri, are characterised by erratic rainfall patterns and complex river basin dynamics,

The flood, which began over the weekend and worsened in the following days, was the direct result of excess water from the Alau Dam. The collapse of the spillways unleashed a significant surge of water downstream, causing widespread flooding in the surrounding communities. As I put together this brief report, efforts are ongoing by government and relevant agencies to evacuate and resettle residents in the affected areas, while efforts are also on the way to ensure the provision of food, shelter, and medical assistance, I must say that the situation is overwhelming. The IDP camps that were officially closed by the government have been reopened to accommodate people.

The severity of this flood has far exceeded what the government and all of us estimated, marking it the most catastrophic flood in Maiduguri in over three decades. The flood's unprecedented scale has presented challenges beyond our previous experiences as more than half of the city is under water. Many lives have been lost and properties worth billions of naira, including livelihoods have been lost too.

CATHOLIC CHURCH AND OTHER CHURCHES

On our part, the Diocesan Secretariat and St. Patrick's Cathedral are all flooded. The following Parishes were also affected badly, St. John Custom, St. Michael Railway, and St Augustine Gwange. Although we are still carrying out the assessment of the disaster, we are estimating over 20,000 Catholics are affected, in those parishes, close to 3,000 households. Many other Churches like St. John's Anglican, First Baptist, Cherubim, COCIN, ECKWA and many others have all been badly affected.

As you can see from the images, over 40% of the city is still submerged in the waters. It is difficult to ascertain the extent of loss of lives and property. Measures are being put in place, data are also being collected for an accurate and detailed categorization of the loses.

RISKS:

Possible outbreak of cholera, malaria, Diarrhea. As we all pray for our loved ones in Maiduguri, let us be aware that the flood waters are now a COCKTAIL of hazards, pathogens from decomposing bodies from the graves, waste water from the hospitals, gutters, soakaways, wildlife from the zoo, broken glass/bottles,exposed iron rod etc.

AWARENESS AND ENLIGHTENMENT CAMPAIGN

We are creating awareness and enlightening our people especially our young ones to stop entering the flood waters, it is equally a public health disaster and we all have to stay safe. May God almighty will see us through this catastrophy and alleviate all our suffering.


